Agency Update & Highlights

- We continue making progress towards completing the Homeowner Recovery Program.
- The agency made significant progress reconciling larger activities, preparing for completion of the activities.
- The Residential Property Elevation Fund has utilized much of its allocated funding, maximizing its impact where elevation of rehabilitated structures is required. With the MIT funds alone NCORR has been able to elevate 200 homes to date.

Mitigation and Resiliency Highlights

- The CDDL continues to work with State Resilience Office staff, specifically those focused on CDRZ communities, to support development of projects in Tyrrell County.
- The State Climate Office to ensured the functionality of the Application Programming Interface that provides the data on the [Climate Projections page on the NC Resilience Exchange](#).
- Demolition efforts continued for structures acquired through the buyout program, helping to reduce future flood risk and improve community resilience.



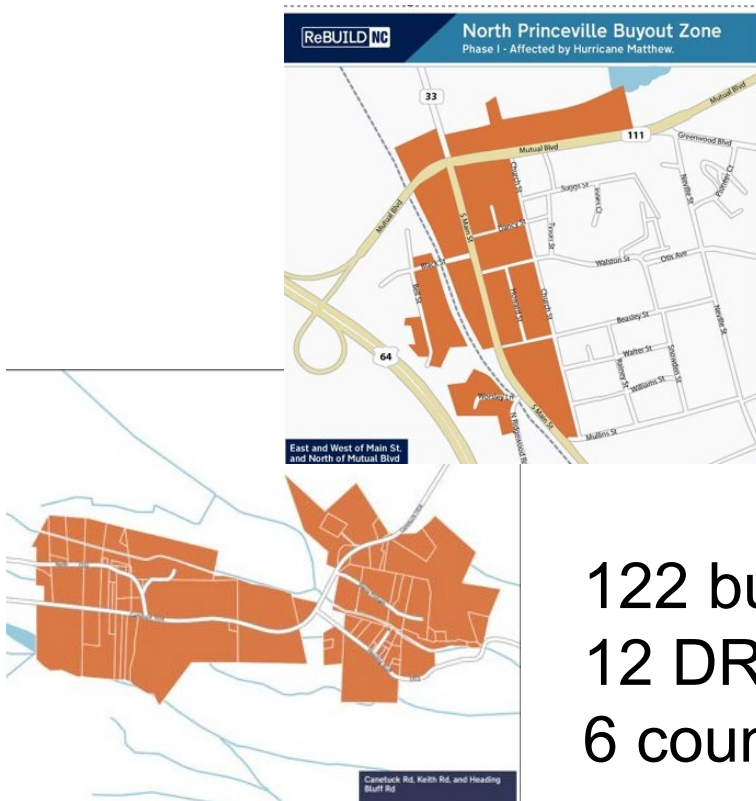
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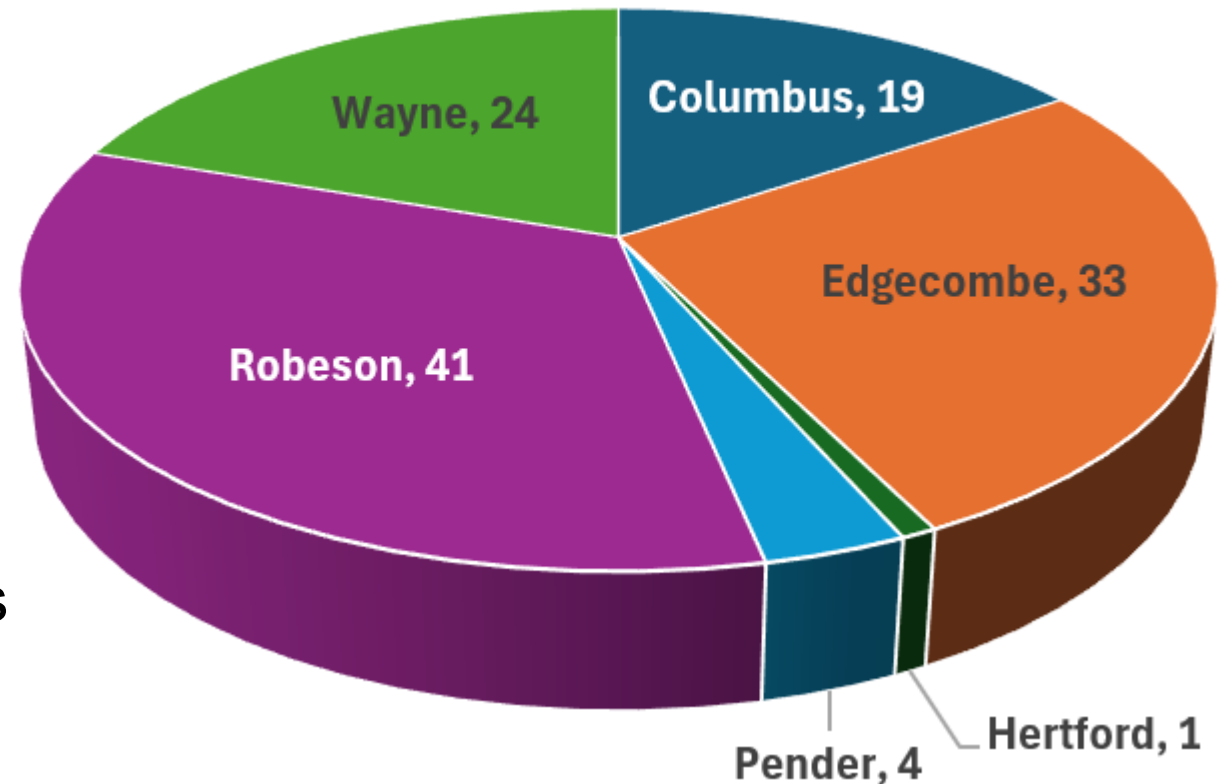

NCORR Strategic Buyout Program Accomplishments



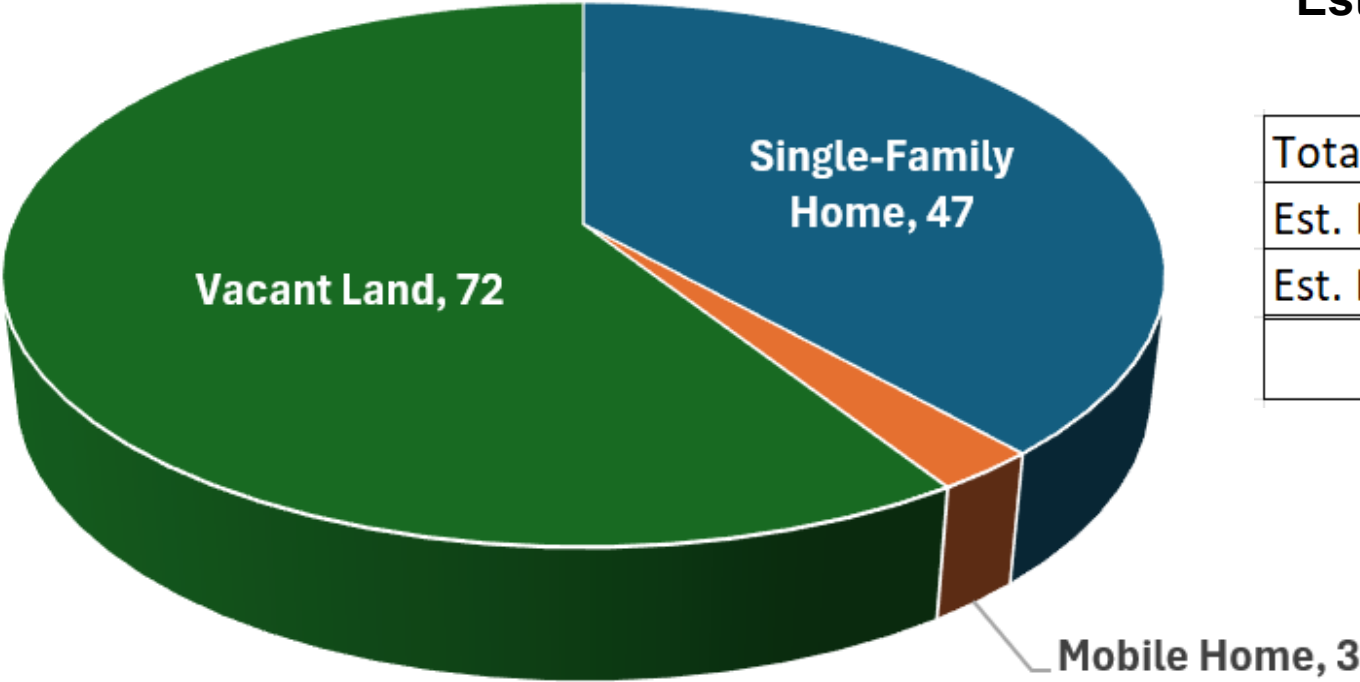

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Community Development Projects in Mitigation | Summary

Community Development Project Update

- 28 projects valued at \$149 million, with \$89.7 million in grant funds (2/3 total costs)
- Providing vital infrastructure plus 367 apartments and homes for families earning up to 80% of area median income (AMI)
- Infrastructure projects 2/3 complete, up from 50% in July
- 80% of affordable housing projects achieved environmental clearance since last CAC meeting
- Construction set to begin in Duplin, Jones, Scotland and Pamlico Counties
- Successful downpayment assistance program ends, with 101 families buying first homes

Project Spotlight: Drainage Assessment for Bladen County



A Comprehensive Stormwater Drainage Assessment Report was completed for Bladenboro, Clarkton, Dublin, Elizabethtown, Tar Heel and White Lake.

The study inventoried assets, updated mapping, identified flood risks, and recommended drainage improvements. A capital improvement plan was created to address safety and resiliency in future storms.



Project Spotlight: St Pauls' Stormwater Improvements



During Hurricane Matthew the area between Elizabeth Street and Johnson Street suffered major flooding. Stranded residents required emergency evacuation.

NCORR's funding is helping prevent future events by routing floodwater south of residential areas to connect with St. Pauls' stormwater infrastructure system.



Project Spotlight: Meadow Villas in Beulaville



The Town of Beulaville is teaming with a private developer to construct 40 new apartments affordable to families making up to 80% average income.

The Mitigation grant is providing \$9,706,000 (98% of the necessary funding) to ensure the housing will remain affordable for the next 20 years.



Project Spotlight: Candy Park in Pembroke



The Lumbee Tribe of NC is combining \$7,425,000 in grant funding with other sources to construct 30 new single family homes in the Candy Park Community.

This innovative project is the only one in the Mitigation grant portfolio that is building single family housing for homeownership.

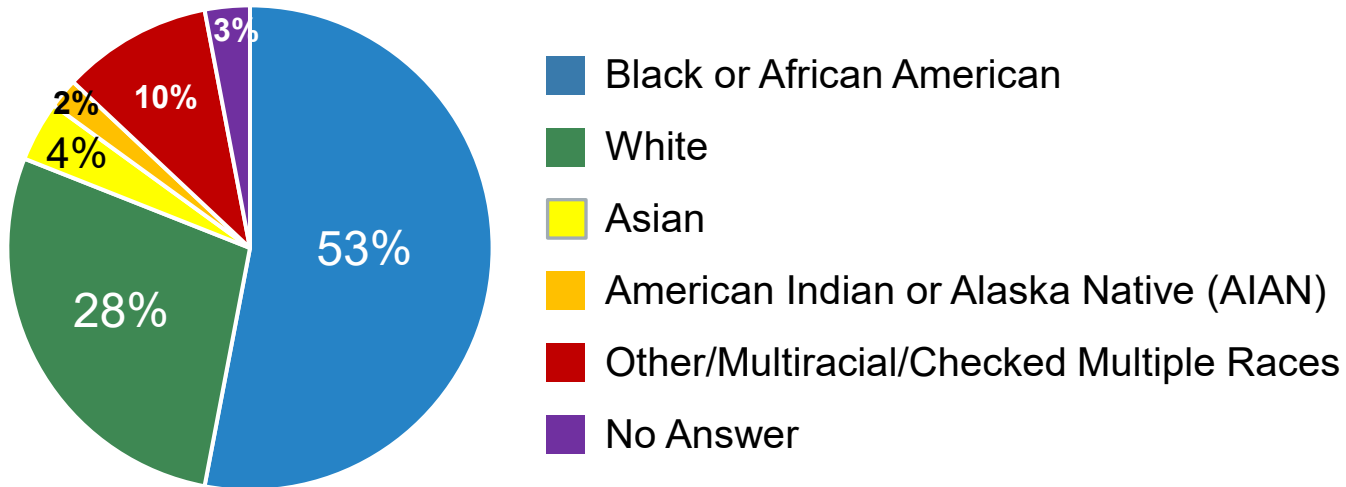

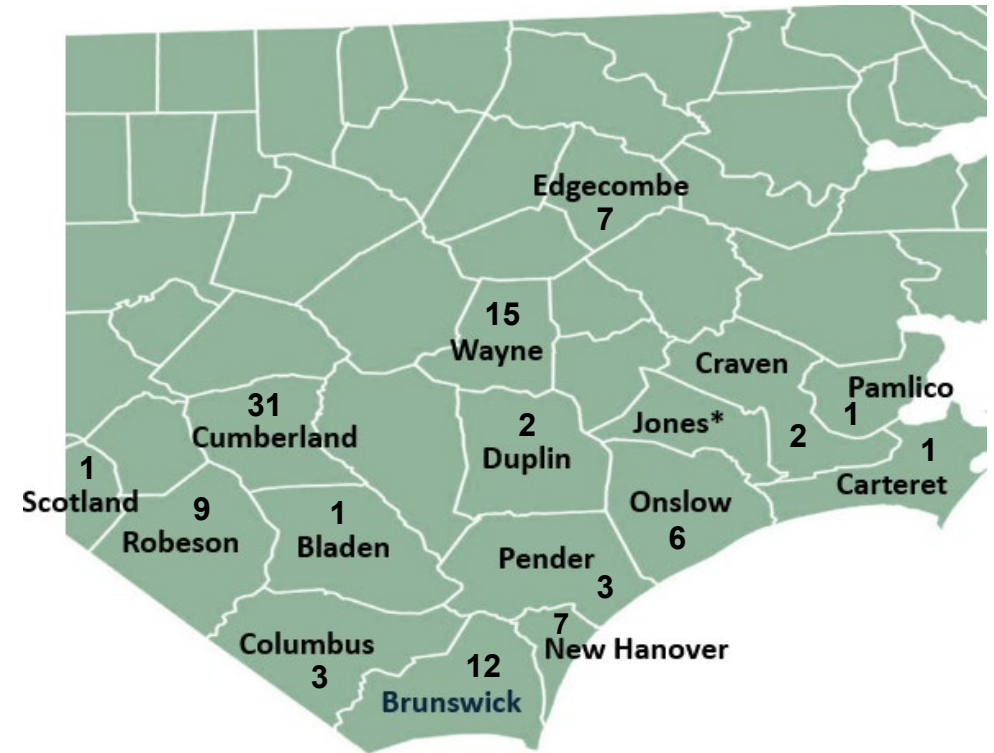
