NOTICE OF INTENT TO REQUEST RELEASE OF FUNDS (NOI-RROF)**

Pursuant to 24 CFR 58.43, this combined Notice of Finding of No Significant Impact and Notice of Intent to Request Release of Funds (FONSI/NOI-RROF) satisfies two separate procedural requirements for project activities proposed to be undertaken by NCORR.

Project Description: NCORR/ NC DPS is responsible for the direct administration of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant – Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) program in North Carolina. NCORR proposes to provide CDBG-MIT funding of \$66,360.00 from the Infrastructure Recovery Program for the Pembroke Park project (“Proposed Project”) located on approximately one acre located along Vance Street near First Street West, Pembroke, Robeson County, NC 28372. According to the Robeson County Tax Map, the two Town-owned parcels are identified as Parcel ID #350402007 which is 0.2 acres and #350402009 which is 0.6 acres and their adjoining Right-of-Way (ROW) (Subject Property). NCORR is also administering NC Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), Mitigation Services Division funding awarded for this Proposed Project. The Proposed Project is anticipated to have a total cost of \$485,562.07.

The Pembroke Park project involves new construction of a Town-owned park with playground structures on a safe permeable surface; natural grit partially permeable walking trails; native plant gardens; a rain garden; interpretive signage; information kiosk; bench swing; picnic tables; seating; lighting; fencing; trees; trash receptacles; mowed lawn areas; and a sidewalk, paved parallel parking spaces, and upgrades along Vance Street. There will also be curb, grate and gutter upgrades on Vance Street. The Town is finalizing these and additional components it might include such as a statue on an appropriate footing, retaining wall; education area with seat walls, etc.



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The Town of Pembroke and Robeson County experienced devastating flooding and damage from the effects of the landfall of Hurricanes Matthew (October 8, 2016) and Florence (September 14, 2018). During the Hurricane Matthew storm event, the Town of Pembroke was negatively impacted by severe rains and overwhelmed with stormwater backups in the area. The Pembroke Park will preserve the property for public recreation on the walking trails and playground while incorporating native plant habitat, educational and flood mitigation components.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

An Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Proposed Project has been prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) and HUD environmental review regulations at 24 CFR Part 58. The EA is incorporated by reference into this FONSI. Subject to public comments, no further review of the Proposed Project is anticipated. NCORR has determined that the EA for the project identified herein complies with the requirements of HUD environmental review regulations at 24 CFR Part 58. NCORR has determined that the Proposed Project will have no significant impact on the human environment and therefore does not require the preparation of an environmental impact statement under NEPA.

This combined notice is being sent to individuals and groups known to be interested in these activities, local news media, appropriate local, state and federal agencies, the regional office of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency having jurisdiction, and the HUD Field Office, and is being posted to the NCORR ReBuild NC website above.

Public Comments on the FONSI and/or NOI-RROF: Any individual, group or agency may submit written comments on the Proposed Project. The public is hereby advised to specify in their comments which “notice” their comments address. Comments should be submitted via email, in the proper format, on or before September 29, 2026, at NCORR.PublicComments@ncdps.gov. Written comments may also be submitted by mail, in the proper format, to be received on or before September 29, 2026, and addressed to: Ms. Jennifer Holmes, NCORR Compliance Director, ATTN: Pembroke Park Project, P.O. Box 110465, Durham, NC 27709. All comments must be received on or before September 29, 2026 or they will not be considered. If modifications result from public comment, these will be made prior to proceeding with the submission of a request for release of funds.

REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS AND CERTIFICATION

On or after September 30, 2026, the NCORR Certifying Officer will submit a request and certification to HUD for the release of CDBG-MIT funds as authorized by related laws and policies for the purpose of undertaking this project under the North Carolina CDBG-MIT Infrastructure Recovery Program.

NCORR certifies to HUD that Jennifer Holmes, in her capacity as Certifying Officer, and her legally authorized successors, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the U.S. federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities, and allows NCORR to use CDBG-MIT program funds.

Objection to Release of Funds: HUD will accept objections to its release of funds and NCORR's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later). Potential objectors should contact HUD or the NCORR Certifying Officer to verify the actual last day of the objection period.

The only permissible grounds for objections claiming a responsible entity's non-compliance with 24 CFR Part 58 are: (a) certification was not executed by NCORR's Certifying Officer; (b) the responsible entity has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before HUD's release of funds and approval of environmental certification; or (d) another federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 or subsequent pertinent regulation has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality.
